-BARN QUILT HÉRITAGE TRAIL - MCLEAN COUNTY-

Sugar Grove Nature Center is excited to participate in the Barn Quilt Heritage Trail - McLean County, thanks to funding from Lorraine (Light) & David Darnall, David Wilson, Anna Marie Chrisman, and Jane Dresner in honor of Joyce Schmoeger. Our quilt will be placed on the corn crib in late August. Nine other barn quilts (including one at Funks Grove Pure Maple Sirup) will be placed in the Shirley-Heyworth area, bringing the total to 21 quilts in McLean County.

Donations Large & Small---They All Make A Difference!!

Many people don't realize that Sugar Grove Nature Center is funded entirely through donations, grants, memberships, and program fees. Equipment & Resource Acquisition

Monarch WayStation

A Schoolyard Habitat Grant from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources provided \$1,000 to establish a Monarch WayStation. This WayStation enhances and expands existing habitat for monarch butterflies, and other pollinators by planting various species of native milkweed and other important pollinator nectar and larval host plants. It also serves to educate people of all ages about the importance of habitat for monarchs and other pollinators. Planning and planting assistance from Master Naturalists, Wild Ones members and other volunteers, interns, scouts, and Nature Fun Club last summer has resulted in a beautiful habitat just buzzing with visitors. 
